Many glorious events and special donations in 2014 have added to the wealth of the collections and the reputation of the

**Naval Marine Archive:** *The Canadian Collection* in this landmark year. This Trafalgar Day was our special 15<sup>th</sup> anniversary, for the **Naval Marine Archive**. Much has happened to make to this outstanding organization, going from strength to strength in this rather difficult climate for heritage preservation.

The yachting collection has drawn avid interest and some very special rare books, such as *Yachting and Cruising for Amateurs*, Frank Cowper, 1912, is an exemplary part of the yachting collection donated by C. Yolles who spent sixty years putting it all together. A special collection from the Becker family documenting HMCS *Bras D'Or*, the navy's first hydrofoil, is quite a legacy. Our reputation is far reaching, as the Canadian Power Squadron requested the we take over their library and that was shipped down from Toronto late in the summer.

New furniture in the gallery provides for model display on a handsome marble desk and also more shelves for books courtesy of D. Yolles. Our volunteers have put in many hours with the result that the majority of the aviation book collection (more than ten thousand titles) is now out of the boxes and on new shelving.

Also on the second floor the video editing equipment is set out and will be in use shortly. The Tom Tumilty collection of shipwrecks has many video tapes which need to be converted to digital for preservation.

In conjunction with our Commemoration of the First World War, a number of our artists created beautiful paintings of the first submarines of the Royal Navy in 1914 – one of these is shown here. CSMA member Peter Rindlisbacher had his painting, *First Ladies at Sunset off Fisgard*, published in the Canadian Military Journal.

On the 15<sup>th</sup> of June, there was widespread interest in the presentation *Celebrating Canadian Submariners 1914-2014* with the attendees coming from as far as Toronto and St. Thomas. A number were our members who were former submariners themselves. They enjoyed the presentation and meeting the well known author and authority, Julie H. Ferguson, from British Columbia. Julie discussed the many

changes to the service and some of the difficult times along with the many successes that have kept the Country secure. For those interested in the American Civil War, we are one of the few institutions to have a complete 128 volume set of the official records of the army as well as the thirty volume navy set. To top it off, Judge George Inrig has donated his Civil War collection, some 150 volumes and artwork including a set of prints of major generals of the war.

Two amazing maps of the County, a Tremaine of 1863 and an 1898 Carre revised map, now complement the Marysburgh map of the Loyalist settlers. The recent ‘Show and Tell’ with the new local council went well and they now have an idea of our aims and objectives.

Our summer student, Rebecca Cairns, received a certificate of recognition from the Canadian government for her solo photographic exhibition *Vanishing*. This show was hosted in our gallery at the end of August and enjoyed by all the visitors.



Collaboration with various organizations and institutions both locally in Quinte, Ottawa and a new project in Chicago, has heightened our reputation. Authors from near and far carry out research using our resources and acknowledge this assistance.
